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Nekoma, ND - "We think every individual is important, the most important person in the world. And, if an individual walks in here we'll give him a complete briefing - the whole nine yards."

Glen Robertson, who heads the information center for the Missile Site Radar facility under construction here and the Perimeter Acquisition Radar site at Concrete, ND, keeps himself busy showing visitors the Safeguard System with those words.

Since July 1970, when he started keeping records, Robertson has shown 2,210 visitors the massive complex of steel and concrete that are to become the eyes of protection from nuclear missile attack against the United States and North America.

The tours have been for both groups and individuals. He has also given almost 130 briefings both on and off the antiballistic missile sites to an audience of over 3,000 people.

Visitors can't go on the construction site now except on weekends, Robertson says. And, with that restriction many of his weekends have been spent at work. He did just that Easter Sunday when he took a group of visitors through the Nekoma site.

Visitor's center at the site here is a 28 by 56 foot mobile home that he says "includes an auditorium."
